Our members continue to make important contributions to research in the areas of policy, administration, and nonprofit studies. We apply a range of tools, both computational and theoretical, to local and global problems. I continue to see more work in our premier journals that either use or require a complexity and network lens to better understand how social, ecological, political, and economic systems operate. More and more NSF programs require interdisciplinary work, including the Cyber Physical Systems and Smart and Connected Communities grants. It is becoming evident that the NSF and other funders understand that researchers with an eye toward complex systems and the interconnections among actors are valuable social science members on the interdisciplinary teams required to address our most pressing challenges.

I value the work of this section and hope we can continue to grow. Not just for the sake of having a larger section, but for building and sustaining a dialogue around complex systems in Public Administration and for carving out greater space in our journals, conferences, and statehouses for

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our work. In that regard, I have a small request. I would ask that each of you recruit 1-2 students or colleagues whose work is influenced by complexity and networks and whose voice would contribute to our mission. I think both they and our section would benefit from their inclusion.

It was great to see everyone in Denver. A few notes and comments coming out of the 2018 conference. First, our section held two pre-conference workshops, one on an intro to social network analysis and another on exponential random graph models. We intend to continue the SCNS workshop series that began in 2017. I will be reaching out to several of you to discuss topics and dates. More information can be found in the newsletter below. Second, our section is looking for someone to take over our Twitter page. If you are social media savvy and would like to keep up on the latest research in our field, please let me know and we can provide you with the account information so you can begin posting. Third, given the overlap in our research interests, our section will be coordinating with SIAM to take on a larger role at the Deil Wright symposium at the 2019 conference. Fourth, our section will sponsor a new panel to be held at ASPA each year that brings together leaders in our field to discuss the role of complexity theory and networks in public administration scholarship and practice. The goal is to showcase the contributions and value of our section's work.
