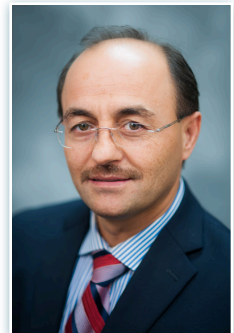

ASPA 2017 Annual Conference, March 17 - 21, Atlanta, GA

ASPA Annual Conference was held in Atlanta, GA between March 17 - 21. SCNS members collaborated to submit complete panels for the 2017 Annual ASPA Conference in August of 2016. Three panels including 12 papers have been successfully submitted and accepted for presentation. The first panel focused on the applications of collaborative governance network theories and concepts using social network analysis and big data analytics.



Second panel dealt with the issues of accountability and interoperability in the context of collaborative governance networks. Third panel scrutinized the role of power, trust and micro-level processes in collaborative governance. This coming July, Dr. Kolpakov will send call for papers for organizing complete panels on behalf of our section. Potential topics include processes in collaborative governance, collaborative performance, governance and complexity, collaborative leadership, accountability, power and trust in collaborative networks, collaborative governance, interoperability and advances in social network analysis and complexity research

SNA Workshop

At this year's ASPA annual conference, SCNS hosted the first section-sponsored workshop titled "A Beginners Guide to Social Network Analysis." The objective of the workshop was to provide a user friendly introduction to the methods and tools of network analysis. It was designed for both practitioners and researchers looking to better understand the methodology and its application to the study of public administration. During the workshop, Dr. Michael Siciliano gave a broad overview of network theory, data collection, and measurement. Tom Haase provided a hands-on guide to using UCINET to import, visualize, and analyze network data. This was followed by four presentations highlighting applications of social network theory and methods: (i) Naim Kapucu showcased his work on disaster networks; (ii) Chris Koliba discussed how network and complexity theory inform his research on watersheds and ecological systems, (iii) Aleksey Kolpakov demonstrated network approaches for reducing crime and recidivism, and (iv) Jack Meek presented work on local and regional governance networks.

SCNS Executive Board Election Results

SCNS filled three vacant executive member positions after an election in February, 2017. Fatih Demiroz, Aleksey Kolpakov, and Kun Huang were elected to serve on the executive committee of the section for three years. Their terms will expire in 2020.

Best Paper Award

SCNS will offer *Best Paper Award* (\$200) named after Sam Overman. The first award will be presented at the 2018 ASPA- Denver and will be awarded to SNCS members only.

Criteria for the best paper award include: (1) contribution to network or complexity literature, (2) relevance to public administration, and (3) research quality (theoretical, methodological).

Nominations for the SCNS best paper award are submitted by SCNS members. Self-nominations are welcome.

Complexity, Networks, and Governance Journal

The Complexity, Networks, and Governance Journal is all open-access now thanks to the sponsorship of Bamberg University, Germany. A special issue on complexity, innovation, and policy was published in spring 2017. A new issue of the journal will be published in fall 2017.

NECOPA 2017 Conference - Complexity and Networks Track

The University of Vermont will host the Northeast Conference on Public Administration (NECoPA) on November 3, 4, and 5, 2017. Inspired by the Vermont traditions of grassroots democracy and strong local “town meeting” culture, and collaboration across public, private and nonprofit sectors, this year’s NECoPA theme is: **Public Administration, Policy and Community Development: Managing a Changing Landscape**



The conference will organize a panel titled *Communities as Complex Adaptive Systems*. Possible topics include: public administration and computer modeling; e-governance; models of networks and systems governance; evolving uses of social media; leading in complex environments; the uses of game theory in public administration; the role of the behavioral and decision sciences in public administration; utilization of performance management systems; the role of design and systems thinking in public administration.
